Business Arising:

Locker replacement—Joseph Innocent reported that the lockers on base are going to be removed maybe by mid-November and once this happens, they are ours. We may have them after Christmas break.

Library—there has been no change in status. Katherine brought the situation up at a principal's meeting and all the schools are in the same predicament, with no solutions available. We are allowed volunteer readers to come in, and we can take students to the library to look at books, but they then have to shelve the books themselves. Wallace mentioned that once the contracts are signed with the EA's, librarians will not be included in the contract, so then we can find volunteer librarians.

Air conditioning/ventilation fundraiser—ventilation projects are separate from major capital projects, although there is money available each year for ventilation. The question is, can we fundraise for air conditioners? Wallace thought perhaps but would have to check that they meet a certain standard. Katherine will check with facilities and get back to Ashley. DEC Report:

Motions – DEC Public Meeting – 25 September 2025

DEC Meeting Schedule I move that the proposed DEC meeting schedule for school year 2025-2026 be approved.

DEC Priorities: I move that the following DEC Priorities be approved for the District Education Council for the school year 2025-2026:

Infrastructure We will continue with our efforts to create a long-term capital plan for the District, while continuing to enhance and maintain all of our district facilities / infrastructure to ensure they are safe, structurally sound, technologically savvy, and are a welcoming environment for all students and staff. Engagement with our school communities will be essential in this endeavor.

District Plan We will support the Superintendent in the implementation and monitoring of the new three-year District Plan (2025-2028) with the overarching themes of "Learn, Be Well, Be Respectful". We will closely monitor the district's progress in the areas of numeracy and literacy while ensuring that our district policies continue to reinforce our commitment to creating a positive learning environment by providing students and staff

with the proper tools, training, and facilities needed to promote continuous student learning and growth.

First Nation and Diversity The Council will continue to become more aware of the history, culture and teachings of our First Nations and will support efforts to acknowledge and accept the work of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. Additionally, we commit to ensuring that our school communities are supportive of all learners regardless of race, ethnicity, cultural background, gender, lived experience, ability, or socioeconomic status.

Flagpole Initiative: I move to rescind the DEC motion regarding flagpoles, passed at the 23 January 2025 Public Meeting and to replace it with the following: The Superintendent will procure mobile flagpoles for the existing ASD-West schools, in a phased approach over the next five years, as finances become available. Any new school infrastructure will include three outside flagpoles as part of the building plans.

DEC Meeting Procedure Policy: I move that the proposed DEC Public Meeting Procedure Policy be approved and adopted as ASD-West Governance Process Policy 5 effective immediately. Capital Improvements for 2026-2027: I move that the proposed Capital Improvements List for 2026-2027 be approved and submitted to the Department by 30 September 2025

New Business:

New Ed plan review—Wallace met with Tiffany Bastion and found out that they are behind in schedule, and there is a meeting with DEC on November 6th.

A public meeting will be held about the Ed plan November 4th at 6 pm at the Crown Plaza. Questions were raised about whether the government has released enough information to the public, and many people think not.
